I hope that everyone had a relaxing break with family and friends over the last few weeks. It was certainly well-deserved! As the second half of the school year begins, it's important to remember all of the great things that are happening in our school district!

For example, our teachers meet or exceed the State average in five VAM areas. Also, through the tireless efforts of many, we have seen an unprecedented number of Industry Certifications earned by our students. Additionally, our overall dropout rate saw a 50% decrease, while the number of students with disabilities graduating with a standard diploma saw a 17% increase.

The Importance of Feedback

In his seminal work, Visible Learning, John Hattie determined the impact that various strategies have on student learning. Of these, feedback was in the top 10. However, it is important to note that feedback can have a negative impact if not done well.

Indeed, while most of us see feedback as being provided by the teacher to the student, research suggests that the most impact is seen when the opposite occurs. Although he acknowledges that feedback from the teacher to the student is vitally important, Hattie notes that feedback from students to their teachers is critical, as this enables teachers to see where students are misunderstanding content, thus making the

learning 'visible.'

When looking for a place to start implementing feedback practices in their classrooms, teachers should consider assessments (both formative and summative). These occasions lend themselves perfectly to providing feedback. For example, before returning graded papers, take a few moments to ask students about areas they found particularly challenging. This can provide teachers with the information they need to tailor future instruction to students' misconceptions.

By working to incorporate feedback into our classrooms, we can continue to improve student achievement!
